WOMEN PHILANTHROPISTS - SPEAK UP!



Sara Wason has spent most of her professional career as a fundraiser, but she's equally comfortable on the other side of

the solicitation, as a philanthropist. In her position as Executive Director of Foundation Relations at Syracuse University, Wason secures funding for programs that enhance entrepreneurship, education, and other issues that matter to the Syracuse community and to women.

In 1999, Wason and her friends Marion Hancock Fish and Laura Lavine attended the first WFCNY gathering at Aminy Audi's home. They were excited about and inspired by the idea of women giving to women. The trio became Charter Donors in honor of their lifelong friendship, joining the group of trailblazing women who were committed to leaving a legacy of support and empowerment for women in our community.

A native of Syracuse, Wason returned to the area from a brief stint in California after rekindling a friendship with her soon-to-be husband, Jay. They both have strong roots in Central New York and decided to make this their home and raise their three children here. Wason has volunteered with several local not-for-profits, but confesses that she feels most connected to the WFCNY and its focus on "being with women and for women."

Sara Wason believes that when you invest in women, you invest in the community. She feels that despite some socioeconomic gains, too many women

are still living on the edge, struggling as heads of households to raise children and make ends meet. She stresses that women philanthropists understand and embrace causes that reflect systemic issues like education, health, domestic violence, and poverty. And because she's convinced that women are at the center of communities, she wants that support to be used pragmatically – for food, clothing, fuel, housing, and for developing the skills that will translate into greater opportunity, confidence, and self actualization. Build up a woman, says Wason, and you buoy a community.

Wason's involvement with the WFCNY has stayed strong through the years. Along with her continual financial support, she has given generously of her time and talents as chair of the Governance Council, Grants, and Fund Development committees. Her favorite programs are those that creatively help the truly marginalized in our community —refugees or women reentering the workforce as entrepreneurs and in non-traditional jobs.

In her current role as a member of the Fund Development Committee, she's determined to help the WFCNY reach its goal of \$1 million to tell a million stories. "Women are a force and they need to understand the power of philanthropy and the need to use their pocketbook and their voice to inspire their sisters to embrace this power," says Wason. "And we need more attention paid to getting women out of poverty, as this is the shortest path to a healthier, more vibrant community."





HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

COMMUNITY ACTION PARTNERSHIP FOR MADISON COUNTY - MOMS MOVING FORWARD PROGRAM

This grant was given to fund meetings and activities promoting health and wellness for mothers and their children in rural Madison County. The grant is being used to pay for transportation, groceries, supplies, and child care support. Community Action Partnership for Madison County has been attempting to get comprehensive programming like this in place for a long time, and this grant finally made it possible. Now, moms have transportation to visit the Syracuse Regional Market. The organization can pay for groceries for cooking meetings and snacks for participants, and can buy folders and print fliers. Incredibly important is the ability to support the cost of child care with the help of the grant from the Women's Fund.

We've been able to grant funds to Catholic Charities for computers in the women's shelter as well as for transportation and child care to help women more effectively apply for jobs. The program director had a chance to ask some of the women how this grant has helped them. This is what they had to say.

"Thank you so much for the computers in the shelter. It is very nice for us to be able to find jobs and housing. For me personally, it's been helpful to look up my medical issues."

"We really appreciate having a computer in the house."
